From Fr. Dan:

Thursday is the feast day of St. Therese of Lisieux, the patron saint of our parish. She was born on January 2, 1873, in Alencon, France, the youngest child of Louis Martin, a watchmaker, and Zélie-Marie Guérin, a lacemaker, and died of tuberculosis on September 30, 1897. Therese joined the Carmelites when she was 15. She suffered a great deal in her last two years of life, enduring her pain without complaint.

The world is so familiar with her today because of her spiritual memoir, *The Story of a Soul*, which she wrote at the insistence of her religious superiors. It became the religious bestseller of the 20th century. She never did anything that most people would consider extraordinary but lived out her vocation with extraordinary dedication and love. Because of the popularity of her memoir and the large number of miraculous cures and other spiritual favors attributed to her intercession, she was canonized surprisingly quickly, by Pope Pius XI in 1925.

All of us are to strive for holiness, and St. Therese recognized that heroic acts are not necessary to attain this. Her approach became known as her "Little Way," which involves a realistic awareness of one's limitations and the wholehearted giving of what one has, however small the gift. She wrote, "Love proves itself by deeds, so how am I to show my love? Great deeds are forbidden me. The only way I can prove my love is by scattering flowers and these flowers are every little sacrifice, every glance and word, and the doing of the least actions for love."

When she served as assistant to the novice mistress, she once wrote her novices, "We must realize the moment when our work is done, or rather the work God has given us to do for Him, and when we have to step aside and leave the rest to Him. So many souls fill themselves with utterly needless disquiet, wondering whether what they have done will be crowned with success, whether they ought not to have said or done something in a different way to what they have done. No! What is done has been done, and now leave the rest to God. . . . All we have to do is to rest with complete abandonment in His good pleasure and be pleased with the issue He gives, whatever it be."

For much of her life as a Carmelite nun, St. Therese experienced spiritual darkness. "I thank Jesus for making me walk in darkness, and in this darkness I enjoy a most profound peace," she wrote. About this darkness she also wrote, "Your Thérèse is not found up in the heights these moments; but when in this dryness and incapacity for prayer, in order to practice virtue, I look for those small occasions, those trifles in order to give pleasure to Jesus, a smile, or a kind word for instance, when I would wish to be silent. If these occasions do not come I at least try to tell Him often how much I love Him. This is not difficult and helps to keep the fire of love burning in my heart."

There is much we can learn from this amazing woman. I hope many of you will take advantage of the Eucharistic Adoration by which our parish will mark her feast day and join us in the closing Mass at 6:30 p.m.

The Church's first ever joint canonization of a husband and wife will take place next month when Pope Francis will canonize St. Therese's parents. Louis and Zelie married in Alencon in 1858 and lived as celibates for the first year of their marriage. After a confessor encouraged them to raise children who would grow up to praise God, they parented nine children. Of the five who reached adulthood (all daughters), each entered religious life. A very devout family, the Martins also opened their home to the poor, visited the elderly, and made it a point to teach their children to treat the underprivileged as equals. Although they lived comfortably, thanks in part to Zelie's prosperous lacemaking business, they also suffered greatly over the deaths of four children and from health problems. Zelie Martin died in 1877 at the age of 45 from cancer. Louis and his daughters moved to Lisieux, where four of his daughters became Carmelites. He died in 1894.
